Tests: There will be 2-3 tests. Most test questions will be conceptual and will require a good understanding of the material rather than rote memorization. this course.

Homework: There will be one homework set per unit, with the average unit lasting 3 weeks. Most homeworks will include a 'mini-project' where you will use a logic-based tool to solve a real problem. In accordance with CSCI department policy, at least one homework will involve a >5 minute presentation or >500 word paper. Feel free to submit homework by email (before class time on the due date), but please keep email submissions platform-independent (pdf, postscript, etc. are OK, but please do NOT send scans).

All submitted work should be written by yourself. It is standard professional practice to acknowledge any assistance you might have received in your homework, including any work done in a group or taken from other sources. I will be enforcing this.
